“Until recently, RSS meant Really Simple Syndication—in other words, it’s functional, but about as exciting as ticker tape,” said Netvibes founder and CEO Tariq Krim. “With Netvibes Coriander Edition, we’re transforming RSS into Really Sexy Syndication, complete with games, podcasts, music, photos, videos, and live sharing capabilities.”

Coriander Edition also includes integrated sharing features so users can instantly share their feeds, modules and Netvibes pages via email or instant messaging. Users have already shared over 15,000 feeds, modules and tabs on the public Netvibes Ecosystem, and with Coriander, they can now share them privately with family, friends and coworkers as well.

Coriander also introduces new search modules and a beta preview of Netvibes' upcoming mobile version, Netvibes2Go (<http://m.netvibes.com>), which synchronizes live with a user's Netvibes page. For example, with the new Craigslist module, Map Comparison Search module and Netvibes2Go, apartment hunters can receive map directions and updates on their cell phone whenever a two-bedroom, cat friendly apartment opens up in their neighborhood. They can also receive email, weather reports, blogs and more on any mobile web device.

"Information overload is a growing problem for Internet users, and Netvibes seeks to solve that with a very useful approach," says Greg Sterling, founding principal of Sterling Market Intelligence. "It combines the utility of search with RSS and structured content feeds that make it more useful than a search engine alone."
